Dear Ms. Weiner:

On behalf of the Librarian of Congress, I am pleased to accept and acknowledge your recent gift to the Library of about 95 volumes of telephone directories from towns in Belarus, Lithuania, Moldova, and Ukraine, as well as photocopies of four directories from Poland. The Library's holdings of telephone directories from these four countries have many gaps and cover primarily the largest cities. Your collection fills numerous gaps and includes many small towns and villages that were not represented in the Library's collections. We now believe that we have the largest collection of telephone directories for these countries to be found outside of the four countries themselves.

Mr. Grant Harris has told me that these directories are quite difficult to acquire and are very important for genealogy and family history. He will be making efforts to attain the digital rights so that the Library can digitize the directories and make them publically available on the Library of Congress website, and would then encourage outside parties to conduct Optical Character Recognition to provide keyword searching of the texts. We are grateful to you for making this important and valuable gift possible. Your gift will be welcome addition to the collections conserved by the Library and will be highly valued by staff and researchers for many years to come.

Because my letter is the Library's official acknowledgment of your gift, I also take this opportunity to confirm for you for tax purposes that the Library has not provided you with any goods or services in exchange for this donation. As required by the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993, please retain this letter as documentary evidence of that fact in support of any deduction that may be claimed for this gift.
